Jesus spoke to the people once more and said, "I am the light of the world. If you follow me, you won't have to walk in darkness, because you will have the light that leads to life." (John 8:12)

There are at least five reasons why light is important.

First, light is essential for vision. I'm sure you have noticed as the sun goes down late in the day and shadows grow darker, it's more difficult to see. If the moon and the stars aren't in the night sky, by the time it's pitch black you see nothing.

Light is also essential for color. As the light dims, colors fade. For this reason, light is a necessary ingredient for beauty in the world.

Third, the earth's food chain depends on light. Photosynthesis is the process whereby plants use the energy of light to produce food. In other words, without light, there is no life.

It's also worth noting that for a lot of people, light is a key element of happiness. Many studies have shown higher levels of depression where there is less natural light. This seems to be true for some who work indoors, as well as for those who live in areas where there are seasonally shorter days.

"You are the light of the world—like a city on a hilltop that cannot be hidden." (Matthew 5:14)

During the month of September, our youth and young adults served our members and community in several ways. We had an early Saturday morning serving food and supplies at the Community Harvest Food Bank, we decorated, planted, and delivered many mum plants, helped at the Kuehnert Farm, provided a fund raiser for The Lighthouse in Ft. Wayne, and helped "Chalk the Walk" to spread uplifting messages to all. In fact, we labeled the month "Serving September". And you know what? It was fun! We all had fun. And we were doubly blessed. As we gave of our time and talents to spread hope, love, and joy, we received that hope, love, and joy right back.

We are called to be Christ to our world. The effect of our interacting with people and the planet should add vision, beauty, life, and happiness. When we represent the Lord in the way he hopes we will, that's when the church is at its best, becomes most productive, and remains relevant. And being that light not only changes the world, it can change you as well.

James 3 tells us that our tongues can do quite a bit of damage. Name-calling, bickering, whining, and put-downs tear people apart. But, our tongues can also be used for good. They have the power to heal, encourage, and restore relationships. Our tongues can speak words of praise to God, too.

This month, I want to encourage you to set an example for your family by using appropriate, uplifting words and by apologizing to them when you mess up. Little ears are always listening, even before children can talk, so choose your words wisely.

Another way to set a positive example is to know when to stop talking. Proverbs 10:19 says, "Too much talk leads to sin. Be sensible and keep your mouth shut." Help children understand the importance of stopping to think before speaking. When in doubt, it's always better to seal your lips than to say something you might regret. It's also confusing to kids when their parents set rules against swearing but don't follow them. Avoid that double standard by modeling how to censor your words—especially when you're upset.

Most importantly, talk frequently about Jesus and his love. When you and your family stay focused on Jesus, the Word, then your mouths and lives will bear good fruit for him.

5 Ways My Dad Helped Me Transition into Adulthood By Alex McMurray

As I made the transition into adulthood, I knew I could always count on my dad. Here are five ways he helped me grow as I became a young adult.

Storage containers and piles of my belongings lined the hall, ready to make the 18-hour drive. I was excited to start my internship at FamilyLife[®], but it meant moving away from everything I knew and making my transition into adulthood.

As I entered this unfamiliar territory, I knew I could always count on my dad. And that was enough for me to have the courage to step out on my own and pursue God's calling.

My parents have been my greatest teachers as I've made the transition into adulthood. As the leader of our family, my dad, especially, has played an irreplaceable role in my life. Here are five ways my dad helped me grow as a young adult.

1. He knew when to protect me and when to push me.

My dad has always been a safe person for me to go to when I needed support. He gives me his input while challenging me to problem-solve and make decisions for myself.

Last fall, I sensed the Lord might be calling me to move away from the small town in Pennsylvania where I grew up. I was having a hard time because home was familiar, and therefore, secure. My dad challenged me to think through what it meant to be obedient to God's calling.

Shortly after I decided to trust God with my future, I was invited to learn more about working with FamilyLife at Cru® headquarters in Or-

lando, Florida. My dad's willingness to lovingly confront me and the things I was holding on to prepared me to step into my current role as a FamilyLife intern.

2. He showed up when I needed him.

During my senior year of college, I received some devastating news that changed the course of my life. It felt like the world around me stopped. All I wanted to do was go home.

I called my dad and told him what happened. I could tell he hurt for me. He left work early to drive four hours to pick me up so we could process and grieve together. When I called my dad, I didn't worry whether or not he would answer. Just like I trust that God is listening when I come to Him. My dad's love reminds me that family is the safest place to be when you're hurting. And it is always okay to come to your father (earthly *or* Heavenly).

Jesus reminds us He, too, will be there when we need Him: "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light" (Matthew 11:28-30).

3. He encouraged me to confidently embrace my identity in Christ.

Recently, I struggled with feeling rejected for living out my faith. My dad listened intently as I asked some hard questions. "Doesn't being 'the good girl' make me more vulnerable?" "How do I live out my faith in a world that wants to destroy it?" My dad reminded me that goodness will always be challenged by darkness in this world. But there is nothing to fear because we already know goodness wins. These words of wisdom come from John 16:33 where Jesus tells His disciples they will face opposition for following Him, but they can find comfort in knowing there is victory in Christ.

You don't need to have all the answers for your kids as they transition into adulthood, but it's important to lead them back to the Father who does.

4. He taught me to grieve with a sense of hope.

"In seasons like this, we need to count our blessings," my dad reminded us often during a year of unexpected hardships. He was consistently looking for evidence of God's faithfulness. His unwavering trust in the Lord allowed him to be an anchor for our family. After my grandma passed away, I wondered how we could handle another

loss. I looked to my dad as the leader of our family and was surprised to see he was maintaining a sense of hope while grieving. I asked how he could look forward to the future when it felt like we were all waiting for the next bad thing to happen. He explained that sometimes the bad will seem to outweigh the good in life, but we will find the good if we continue to look for it. Even if there is nothing good about the situation itself, we can hope in the fact that God is still working. There is much security in knowing God is with us and that He uses even the hard stuff to accomplish His good purposes (see Romans 8:28).

First Thessalonians 4:13 reminds us we were not made for this world. When we grieve the painful realities of this life, we can hold on to the hope of eternity.

5. He helped me to not take myself too seriously.

As I got older, life got heavier, and I felt discouraged. My dad validated my concerns, but he also reminded me to keep things in perspective. No matter how scary or painful things were in the moment, they would eventually pass. One way my dad helped me see this was through his sense of humor. Once, during my senior year of high school, I was in the emergency room icing my swollen jaw after a car accident. A technician had commented that I should be out having fun with friends on a Friday night, not getting a CT scan.

Trying to make light of a bad situation, my dad looked at me with a smirk and said, "Just imagine what your senior pictures will look like if you have to get your jaw wired shut!" He proceeded to describe how "great" my smile would look in those pictures. I knew he was joking, and it was nice to laugh at the end of a hard day. My dad's balance of acknowledging reality and looking for moments of lightheartedness helps me move forward in my own life as I transition into adulthood.

Your kids' transition into adulthood needs your leadership

What does all of this mean for you dads who are reading this? Remember, you are an integral part of your child's transition into adulthood. In times of uncertainty, let them know they can come to you to get clarity and direction. When you see them struggling spiritually or giving into despair, fight for them. Learn when to protect them and when to push them. Show up during their best and worst moments. Encourage them to embrace their identity in Christ. Show them how to hope in the Lord. And help them find moments of joy and laughter (even if it does mean acting a little goofy in the ER). Even though I've moved away, I know I'll always need and want my dad. I'm so thankful for his leadership in my life.

This will be determined after the second interview.

Education Committee: Monica Getts reported MYFROG had their kick-off party at the Buesching's, 60 people attended. The families and youth had a good time catching up and swimming. Rally Day is Sunday, September 13. Sunday School begins September 20 and Confirmation will be taught during the Sunday School hour.

Elders Committee: Alan Kuehnert reported the Elders met with the Outreach Committee about how they can help with Back to Church Sunday. On August 23rd, they met with Pastor Ric for an exit interview. Pastor Ric was very complimentary of the church and its members.

Finance Committee: Teresa Salesman reported the committee reviewed the general fund, the Education Committee fund, and the MYFROG fund. Everything was found to be in good order.

Outreach Committee: Diane Swihart reported the Baby Bottles were tallied and the total donations were \$659.02. Thanks to everyone for their generosity.

Back to Church Sunday is September 20th. Approximately 2,250 post-cards were mailed out to members and the community. We will have a church picnic outside following 2nd service featuring Nelson's Chicken. Nelson's will supply the side dishes as well. There will be a free-will donation. We are asking that everyone bring a chair and a portable popup canopy if they have one. Seating will be in family groups. We will have a display of our small groups and possible a library display.

Three charitable organizations will be presented to the Sunday School children and adults to choose which charity we should support with the children's offerings. They are Kids Backpack, Project 216 and St. Matthew's Food Bank.

Property Committee: A new sweeper and been purchased and another one will be purchased. They are working on the playset canopy. The roof is being worked.

Stewardship Committee: Sam VanEvery reported a blood drive is scheduled for October 15 from 2:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. We are asking everyone to make an appointment on-line because if you are a walk-in, you will have to wait.

Worship Committee: David Pranger reported worship robes have been ordered. The Hanging of the Greens will be held on December 6, but there will be no social hour due to COVID-19.

The equipment purchased through the Connect Through Tech Grant is still being worked. The switcher is still on back order. The Committee has asked for council approval to send the letter to church members. A motion to send the letter to the congregation was made by Alan Kuehnert and 2nd by David Pranger. Motion carried.

Christmas Families – Wayne Byerly requested council approval to support the Christmas Families again this year. Now thank we all our God with hearts and hands and voices; Who wondrous things has done, in whom this world rejoices. Who, from our mother's arms, has blessed us on our way, With countless gifts of love, and still is ours today.

Perhaps you know the story that led to the writing of this beloved hymn. German pastor, Martin Rinkart served in the walled town of Eilenburg during the horrors of the Thirty Years War of 1618-1648. Eilenburg became an overcrowded refuge for the surrounding area. The fugitives suffered from epidemic and famine. Rinkart, as the only surviving pastor, conducted 4,480 funerals in these years, including the funeral for his wife. In the face of overwhelming pressure, constant risk and horrendous conditions, Rinkart never stopped ministering to the people of his city. He gave away nearly everything he owned to the poor and needy, though he could barely clothe and feed his own children.

After nearly thirty years of ceaseless struggles, it began to look like peace was within grasp. Wanting to give his children a song to sing to God in thanks at the dinner table, Rinkart sat down and composed what would become one of the most well-known Thanksgiving hymns of all time: "Now Thank We All Our God." In fact, it's been said that, aside from Martin Luther's "A Mighty Fortress," no other song is sung more often in Lutheran churches today than Rinkart's simple tune.

Whether you are able to gather as a congregation in a sanctuary or you are still sheltering at home, I would encourage to you look at this hymn and be reminded under what conditions this song of praise and gratitude was written. In a few short months, the United States has confronted health challenges few Americans have seen before. As for Pastor Rinkart 400 years ago, everything is in seeming chaos, yet Christians today are still able to proclaim, "Now thank we all our God...who wondrous things has done." Like Pastor Rinkart, in the coming weeks and months, we can praise God with good stewardship of our time and abilities to serve our families, our communities and our churches. Like Pastor Rinkart, we can be faithful in worship, prayer and study. And like Pastor Rinkart, we need to be faithful stewards of our treasures. Our local congregations and the NALC need everyone's financial tithes and offerings to maintain and expand ministry and provide assistance to the many in need due to loss of health and employment.

Oh, may this bounteous God through all our life be near us,
With ever joyful hearts and blessed peace to cheer us;
And keep us in his grace, and guide us when perplexed;
And free us from all harm in this world and the next.
